
ARTICLES from our MEMBERS

IT'S A LONG WAY FROM PICARDY

Anyone researching their family tree usually visits a cemetery or two in the process and will read many headstone inscriptions with interest.

I wonder how many people though, would have their own headstone erected and regard the event with sang-froid and much humour in response to the startled reaction of other people?

In 1997 the well-known local historian Philippe Tabuteau of Narara contracted with MucMurtrie and Sons, stonemasons of Point Clare near Gosford, to erect a headstone for him and his wife in Wamberal Cemetery. He was keen to be buried in this particular cemetery as he wished, he said, to be among pioneers.





He described with a grin the hillside plot he obtained as giving "a very nice view down to Wamberal Lake".

The raising of the headstone took place nine years before his demise on 19 October 2006, aged 83.

The inscription recorded his full name and place and date of birth, and similar details for his wife Colette (date of death was left vacant of course).

Reaction to the stone was quick. Some neighbours at Narara, upon seeing the Tabuteau couple in the street, exclaimed "Oh, we got such a shock when we saw both your names on the headstone! We thought you must have been killed together in some terrible accident!" In 1972 Philippe founded Gosford District Local History Study Group which met and worked in the Council-provided Shop 2 at Niagara Park Shopping Centre. Volunteers, most of them also members of the Central Coast Family History Society, did an enormous amount of work in a variety of fields, transcribing difficult old handwriting, drawing and copying plans, and researching and preparing material for publication.

Before the group dispersed at the time of his death, a number of their books had become available to the public such as the Rev. Alfred Glennie Journals, Agnes Fagan's Diary and the Index to the Brisbane Water Bench Books and Court Cases. These were all part of the group's planned multi-series of "Historical Records of the Central Coast".

Philippe took a crash course in book binding which he carried out with his usual enthusiasm.

For visitors who came to the centre to obtain information, there was no fee. However, exchange of information was welcome where possible. The group did not engage in working on family trees for the public, but gave a lot of advice about how and where to seek information.

Philippe was an extremely energetic researcher, and was available to callers on the phone at home until 11 pm. He did much travelling up and down by train to the city, visiting archives and libraries and prevailing on those in charge of relevant records of the Central Coast to allow him access to them. He was not above using his Gallic charm to help things move along!

Most members of CCFHS will have profited from the work of this man and his enthusiastic helpers.

For the Bi-Centenary of NSW in 1988, Philippe and his group played a major role in the erection of the Governor Phillip Memorials around Brisbane Water: Booker Bay, St Hubert's Island, Green Point (obelisks) and Pearl Beach (plaque on a large existing sandstone boulder).

Philippe received a number of awards over the years including the prestigious Certificate of Achievement from the RAHS in 1989.

He invited many complete strangers to stay in his home if they came a long way seeking information, and his wife made all of them very welcome.

Once he contacted some unknown Tabuteaus in Haiti and invited them to stay for a while. The answer came: "Certainly, if you will send us the air fares". The invitation was not pursued.

His French surname was too much to cope with for many people and he was resigned to being called "Mr. Tab-a-Toe".

Sadly, his death ended plans to carry on with many planned publications of our local history records.

Colette Tabuteau died on 18 March 2014 and at this time the family replaced the original headstone with a more elaborate type as seen in one of the photos.



Both came from northern France – Colette from Amiens on the Somme, Picardy, and Philippe from Chaussoy in the same area.

They married some years after the end of World War Two and emigrated to Australia, living first in Sydney and then permanently at Narara. They had four children. Philippe was a very hard worker, and built much of their house himself.

He was employed at various places in our district, including Gosford Brick Works, Gosford District Hospital and the Agricultural Research Station at Narara, (now the Ecovillage).

If Philippe had ever chosen a slogan, I think it would have been "nothing ventured, nothing gained"....

They trod the Boards: Tracing my theatrical ancestors

I knew from family stories that I had theatrical ancestors in my family. My grandmother's father and mother both worked with the Liverpool Repertory


Company in Lancashire, England.

But how was I going to substantiate those family stories and find out more about my great grandparents? I started to search for records and located all the usual suspects: birth, marriage, death and census records piecing together the life of Albert Drummond (1878 – 1941) and his wife Annie Perkins (1881 – 1929).

I also had a photo of Albert with his fellow thespians in the repertory company from the 1920s.

So, I started to search the internet for more information on the theatre in Liverpool in the early 1900s. I found some good websites such as "The British Newspaper Archives" and a history of the Liverpool Playhouse which combined with

my family stories has built up a story of my interesting bohemian great grandparents. It seemed they travelled with the company to New York in 1901 appearing on the stage when they were young. As they aged Albert became the Stage Property Manager, buying props for the play and leasing them back to the company. If the play was a success, he made money, if it flopped, he lost money.

They always lived beyond their means renting a large house for £3 a week entertaining their friends, which was fine when they had the money. However, when money was tight, they took in a blind lodger who they charged £3 a week and Annie would cook for him and read for him in the evenings. They were a very enterprising couple. All three of their children also briefly "trod the boards" in pre-war England of the 1920s and 30s. None of them continued in the profession as they all immigrated to Australia in the late 1940s.

It seems Albert was quite the character right up till his death, walking into the pub shouting "drinks for all my friends" and then letting his son-in-law (my grandad) pay the bill every time.

From photos and stories, I knew quite a lot about my maternal theatrical ancestors, but I was quite surprised to locate theatre blood on my paternal side of the family when searching my paternal great grandmother Rosanna Forman (1860-1941).

It seems, her Uncle Edmund Forman (1851 - 1915) left the family occupation of cordwainer (boot maker) to join the London Musical Halls in the 1880s. First as a banjo player and then as a musical arranger.

I located a lot of information on Edmund on the British Library website and

posters of the "Mohawk Minstrels". Edmund wrote sketches and music for this black and white minstrel company from 1886 – 1888.

But it is as the arranger of the most popular version of the song Molly Malone (also known as cockles and mussels) he is best known. My very English Nana would sing this song to me as a child and I didn't know she was singing a song firmly linked to our family.



Many of the songs that Edmund worked on with his collaborator Harry Hunter such as "They ought to have a muzzle on, 1886" about a young lady are now not politically correct but would have been very entertaining to the Musical Hall audiences of the day.

Edmund did very well, working in the London Musical Halls and buying a house at 519 Holloway Road, Islington where he and his wife Caroline Eva Edwards (1859 – 1915) raised their three children.

His daughter Grace (1880 - 1950) also followed her father onto the music hall stage as a singer for many years.

In 1893 Edmund became a member of the Freemasons joining the "Sir Hugh Myddelton Lodge" in London, he was listed as a Professor of Music in the lodge records.

He lived a comfortable lifestyle dying at the age of sixty-three.

I have found researching my theatrical ancestors has been challenging and enjoyable. Putting my ancestors in the social settings of the times in which they lived has taken the faces from many old photos and created real people that I have now introduced to other members and generations of our family.

Home at Manildra



How often have you pondered... If only those walls could talk. Actually they can. Just listen to chit-chat at family gatherings and ponder that oral history. Capture your family's memories ASAP.

This is my favourite photo of my grandparents Richard and Mary Boyces home on their Manildra property at Duncans Creek. Their granddaughter Gai Swan sits in the sturdy billy cart.

Just look at that interesting construction. We've identified three stages that focus on the history of this home from about 1880s to 1980s.

"It came from the Bowling Alley Point gold fields and was rebuilt here" family recall.

One doesn't think of gold miners having such substantial iron roofed, sturdy timber buildings with six paned, push up windows. Questions immediately spring to mind. Who owned it? Where was it actually situated? Was it perhaps a small business in the village setting or was it part of 'the company' mentioned in Trove articles of 1873 and 1901? ²

From a population of 2,000 in 1901 only 200 were living there in 1901.

The building was moved from Bowling Alley Point and rebuilt on Manildra prior to the Boyce's purchasing the property in 1919. Construction was light slabs arranged perpendicularly. Four rooms were separated by a narrow hall that led to the front verandah.

An age clue.. Family remember son Charles saying, "I was so excited to get there I raced ahead of Dad and was so disappointed when I came to the house, just a tin sort of shelter on poles." He had actually passed the house hidden in thick timber and saw the cow bales. So it seems the house had been on the block many years prior to 1919.

All Boyces spoke of the days it took to chop down and burn the vegetation. Richard insisted each bonfire be piled to maximum height.

The Boyce family.

Until 1919 Grandparents had lived and worked in Walcha on Nivison's *Ohio* and *The Glen* properties. Such great excitement when Richard was at last granted this selection and he was able to purchase their own 885 acre property. Manildra included various simple farm buildings and this home.

Richard & Mary with children aged 12 to 5 years, Marjorie, Charles, Vera, Merle & Norma arrived from Walcha on 10 May 1919. Son Charles drove the sulky and Richard rode horse-back with the cattle and sheep they had reared as poddies while working on *Ohio*.

Two cars took Mary and the children and were driven by step brother William Green and brother in law William Stier. Basic provisions would have included bags of flour, tea, sugar and perhaps some corned meat. Who remembered the matches for that first fire? When and how did the furniture arrive? Who remembers this?

It is so difficult to imagine a 2020's family arriving to live at such a basic situation. A mile up a very rough track to the home paddock and house. No electricity, water, phone, ice or even any neighbours in view. Provisions in Tamworth were 30 miles away and a days journey in the sulky and very limited space for any quantity of items. Interesting to see the first item purchased and noted in Richards's chequebook was a tank.

Early days at Manildra

The family settled into the four rooms .. 4 sisters shared the 2 ¾ beds in the front 2 rooms.. Grandparents had their room opening onto the sitting/dining room. Son Charles slept all weathers on the verandah, sheltered only by a tarpaulin.

Outdoor kitchen.. no, just four posts with an iron roof and with a large cooker.

Charles the right hand man helping with all outdoor farm work including ploughing, fencing, shearing. Marjorie had dual responsibilities- indoor jobs as well as the many occasions they needed another pair of hands to help outside with stock, clearing, seed sowing, harvesting and rabbit trapping.

The three youngest daughters rode two ponies (if not needed for farm work) to Duncans Creek School and left when aged 15. Norma hated school holiday farm chores especially stone picking- picking up stones in the paddock to be ploughed. Merle on horseback, watching the stock, dropped her needlework. Oops that was eaten by a cow!

Social occasions included Saturday dances in Roser's wool shed with local musicians on mouth organ and concertina. Home at dawn as horses were not good/safe in the dark.

Monthly church services in the union church on the main road always attended. The minister and friends welcome for the mid-day meal with Boyces and chats in the shade outside until afternoon tea.

Mens' Cricket in a paddock down the track and tennis very popular on Boyces own home built court.

Despite the busy, busy days, each night the family slept in this little cottage and Charles slept on the open verandah protected only by a tarpaulin.

I was fortunate as a child to capture the magic of lamp light turned low, and to hear the wind sighing in the pine trees around the tennis court as I snuggled in the feather bed that Mum and her sister Merle had shared.

Most memorable was the only Christmas we five Davidsons drove from Millfield and celebrated with our Grandparents, Aunts, Uncles and eight cousins.

Merry Christmas cousins, as you celebrate with your children and grandchildren. Merry Christmas all family historians!

10 Jul 1903 - SAD DEATH.

Raleigh Sun (Bellingen, NSW: 1898 - 1918), Friday 10 July 1903, page 2

SAD DEATH.

DURING the past week death has been very busy in this electorate, but the saddest case was the unfortunate accident by which Mrs. Henry Forbes and a family of ten children have been deprived of a good and kind husband and father. The late Mr. H.

S. Forbes was 51 years of age, and a native of Sydney. For the greater part of his life he resided on the Bellinger, and for a great number of years carried out the duties of a Government maintenance man in connection with the Roads Department in a most faithful and efficient manner. Some score of

years ago he had his head crushed by a log, which produced deafness, and to a large extent this was the cause of his death, as he was quite unable to hear the approach of vehicles when at work on the road. Details of the sad accident appear in our report of the magisterial inquiry, The remains were

interred in the Fernmount cemetery on Sunday afternoon, the solemn burial service being impressively conducted by the Rev. B. Hobson, The funeral procession was a lengthy one, and the number at the grave side was unusually large. We join with the whole district in expressing sympathy for the widow and family, who knew better than anyone else the many good qualities of him whom Providence has seen fit to call at such short notice, away from family and friends. Death must have been instantaneous, as indicated by the placid smile which the face wore as the remains lay in the coffin. The funeral arrangements were carried out by Mr. J. S, While.

War Time Fruit Cake.

No eggs and no dairy

400g raisins 100g mixed peel 450g caster sugar 2 tsps. mixed spice 500ml water 100g beef dripping

Put ingredients into saucepan and set over medium heat until boiling.

Cool at least ½ hour

Sift 3 ½ cups (480g) plain flour and 3tsps bi carbonate of soda

Stir fruit mix into flour

Add 200g chopped walnuts

Spoon into loaf tins

Bake at 170 degrees for about 1 hour

Set aside to cool

1 cup icing sugar Just enough orange juice to make good consistency

Recipe for Mock Sausages

Boil one cup of rolled oats in ¾ cup salted water for 15 minutes; add finely chopped onion to flavour.

Mix well and empty into basin. When cool add one beaten egg, pepper and herbs to taste, one cup of breadcrumbs. Shape into sausages, roll in flour and fry in deep boiling fat until golden brown.



They are very tasty and a good substitute for meat.
Vintage **wartime recipes** are healthy as they contain little fat and sugar.
They also feature small quantities of meat and cheese due to rationing.

Food was rationed progressively from June 1942. Butter was the first item to be rationed, as Australia struggled to meet its commitments to Britain and the troops in the Pacific.

Consumption was limited to one pound (454 grams) per adult per week, reduced to eight ounces in July 1943 and six ounces in 1944. The ration in Britain at the same time was only four ounces.

Housewives were advised to substitute dripping (the fat rendered from mutton or lamb) wherever possible and many children of this era were fed bread and dripping - a staple in poor diets for years. Margarine was also recommended, though many cooks disliked it.

Sandwiches WITHOUT butter.

Some of the recommended sandwiches include:

Cheese spread with grated apple and salt

Cheese spread with grilled bacon

Cheese spread with grated raw carrot and shredded cabbage, bound with mayonnaise

Cheese spread mixed with Bonox and potted meat

Cheese and Bonox spread with minced onion and lettuce

Cheese spread mixed with Worcestershire sauce and tomato sauce

Introducing the Koala Tartan

The Koala tartan was designed to celebrate the beauty of the Australian native marsupial, a much loved Australian national icon.

The tartan colours are intended to represent the Koala: dark and light grey for the majority of their coat colour with white speckles or patches on the rump and chest area and inside ears; black for their nose; pink for the skin colour around the nose and mouth, only seen on close inspection; dark brown for their eye colour and green for the eucalyptus leaves which is their main diet and dwelling tree.

The Lawsons created five tartan patterns to eventually get to the final design.

Once the weavers were happy with the pattern, it was woven into a length of cloth and sent to the Registrar of Tartan along with a five-page application.

The Koala Tartan was also on display at the Liverpool Plains Military Tattoo in Quirindi, near Tamworth, where it was met with public approval.

A woven sample of this tartan has been received by the Scottish Register of Tartans for permanent preservation in the National Records of Scotland. It was registered on the 9th March 2021

The Lawsons will continue to weave the koala tartan fabric, to be sold on order.



It has already had international interest.

Their hope is the tartan will bring awareness to koala conservation.
